EMERGING ISSUES

Over the last several days there has been an increase in local emergency medical service calls related to opioid overdose and visits to local hospital emergency departments related to substance use. Please reach out with any information that would indicate a heightened risk in our community around opioid overdoses or related harms at this time.

Deaths ⁴	• 3 deaths between January and September 2019 (4 deaths in 2018 or 3.8 per 100,000)
Naloxone Distribution ⁵	 47 naloxone kits distributed by CK Public Health in February (87 to date in 2020) 108 naloxone kits distributed through CK pharmacies in November 2019 (November 2019 YTD: 1325; 2018 Total: 1,420)
OVERALL	 The number of opioid-overdose related EMS calls and ED visits in February were higher compared to previous months.

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Figure 1. Opioid overdose-related ED visits and EMS calls, Chatham-Kent, January 2019 to February 2020





Figure 2. Rates4 of opioid overdose-related ED visits, hospitalizations and deaths, Chatham-Kent, 2005-18

The number of kits distributed in 2019 by Chatham-Kent pharmacies was available up to November 2019 through the Ontario Drug Policy Research Network Prescription Opioid Tool.
