OPIOID SURVEILLANCE SUMMARY

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OCTOBER 2021

This summary¹ provides local and provincial surveillance information. For some indicators, there is a lag time to receive data, so data are shown for the most recent complete month available. EMERGING ISSUES

Local EMS calls and ED visits related to suspect opioid overdose, although lower than earlier this summer, continued to be relatively high through September and similar trends so far for October.

Deaths ⁴	 4 suspect drug-related deaths in CK in September (22 to date in 2021) (Figure 1) 6 confirmed opioid-related deaths in CK between January and May 2021 (15 deaths in 2020 or 14.1 per 100,000) (Figure 1)
Naloxone Distribution ⁵	 27 naloxone kits distributed by CK Public Health in September (303 to date in 2021; 429 in 2020) 92 naloxone kits distributed through CK pharmacies in March (2021 YTD: 345; 2020 Total: 1,712)
OVERALL	 The number of opioid-overdose related ED visits, EMS calls and suspect drug deaths remained elevated in September. CK's rate of ED visits exceeds provincial levels (117 versus 80 per 100,000).





Figure 2. Rates4 of opioid overdose-related ED visits, hospitalizations and deaths, Chatham-Kent, 2005-20

All Ontario hospitals are required to report cases of opioid overdose presenting in their EDs to the Canadian Institute for Health Information. Results are considered preliminary and subject to change as emergency departments continue to submit data. Rates are based on 2020 population projections.

⁴ 2019 to 2021 suspect drug-related deaths are based on the Monthly Summary table provided by the Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario, Oct 21, 2021. 2020 and 2021 opioid-related death data are based on the Coroner's Opioid Investigative Aid, Apr 2020 to May 2021, Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario, Sept 22, 2021. Opioid-related deaths include confirmed deaths only, are considered preliminary and are subject to change. 2005 to 2020 ED visits, hospitalizations and deaths were obtained from Public Health Ontario's Interactive Opioid Tool. 2020 death data also include confirmed deaths only and should be considered preliminary as remaining cases are closed by the Office of the Chief Coroner of Ontario.
