



A word from our Medical Officer of Health

As Public Health continues to battle the fifth pandemic wave with Omicron, it seems to me that we might never again have the luxury of viewing the world without the shadow of the pandemic looming over us. Like Alice, we have stepped through the looking glass and nothing is the same as it was. I suspect that things were comparable over a century ago, after the Spanish influenza pandemic. Somehow the memory of that gradually slipped from the forefront of public consciousness. Some historians think that the 1920's roared because people threw off the mental shackles of the first world war and the pandemic. I certainly hope that this can happen again!

The biggest challenge in fighting COVID-19 has not been lack of resources, it has been disinformation and public skepticism over vaccination. Social media generates income based on mouse clicks, regardless of the veracity of what is clicked upon. Promotion of unscientific information has resulted in public confusion and vaccine hesitancy. We have seen scientific and medical expertise be eclipsed by unscientific opinion and even nonsense. It will take a concerted effort by educators and media to reinforce the necessity of relying upon the judgements of qualified scientific and medical experts, rather than unscientific opinions and speculations. Public Health will be leading that campaign, every step of the way.

22 in workplaces



Vaccine Rollout & Support



The COVID-19 vaccine was administered on **250** days of the 2021 calendar year.

CK Public Health clinics were held at over 30 different locations across Chatham-Kent including the Bradley Centre Clinic, schools, recreation centres, service agencies and workplaces.

Mobile and outreach teams served homebound and hospitalized residents, congregate living settings (long-term care, retirement, group homes, shelter populations, temporary foreign agricultural workers), and other priority populations at additional locations throughout CK.

CK Public Health initiated wastewater sampling for COVID-19 surveillance in the city of Chatham, in partnership with Chatham-Kent Public Utilities Commission and the University of Windsor. Plans were underway by the end of the year to expand this surveillance to Wallaceburg.


~400 naloxone kits distributed to clients at risk of drug poisoning and their peers
