Healthy Environments (2)

In 2022, CK Public Health expanded local tick and Lyme disease surveillance efforts in targeted areas. Staff performed active tick surveillance in Rondeau Provincial Park and worked with Park staff to collect ticks from the local deer population in order to update our data on Lyme disease prevalence in the tick population of our known Lyme disease risk area. The Healthy Environments team continued to accept ticks from members of the public as part of our passive surveillance program. The data from these activities provides us with new potential spread areas to monitor for Lyme disease, allows us to communicate risk more accurately to the public, and provides local health care providers with better information to inform treatment.

Chatham-Kent Public Health Inspectors completed **1125** food safety inspections. This includes **280** high risk inspections, **623** moderate risk inspections, and **222** low risk inspections.

169 individuals received food safety certification through our food handler training program.

371 animal exposures were investigated as part of our rabies control program.



The dental program returned to some regular school-based programs in the Fall of 2022. The team began their screening program in schools across Chatham-Kent, performing oral health screening checks for students in **JK, SK, Grades 1 through 4, and Grade 8**. Through this program, oral health needs, such as dental decay, are identified and assistance is provided for access to treatment.

The Ontario Seniors Dental Care Program began to ramp up. This is a government-funded dental care program delivered by CK Public Health. The program provides free, routine dental services for low-income seniors who are 65 years of age or older. There are over 450 seniors enrolled in the program.

School Health



CK Public Health was excited to return to school-based programs in 2022. Much of the focus for the School Health team was immunization catch up. This included offering community-based clinics for school-age children throughout the community, and the return to school-based immunization clinics in the fall. CK Public Health provided over **4,500** immunizations in over **30** schools across Chatham-Kent throughout the fall.

Chronic Disease & Wellbeing



The Chronic Disease & Wellbeing team encompasses a number of programs and services across a wide range of public health topics. Many of these programs and services, that were paused due to the pandemic, were revived in 2022.

Staff hit the ground running on the road to recovery, and continued their efforts to support Chatham-Kent community partners and residents.

- **1,805** naloxone kits were distributed to community organizations through the Ontario Naloxone Program and clients at risk of drug poisoning
- 7 naloxone education sessions were hosted across CK
 The Chatham-Kent Student Nutrition Program served 10,327
 students across 44 different schools, providing over 1 million
 meals
- **1,975** students participated in vaping prevention education sessions
- **26** cessation interventions were provided to youth and young adults
- **216** community program leaders trained as part of the Physical Literacy Chatham-Kent project.

Healthy Growth & Development

The Healthy Growth and Development Team works alongside individuals and families from across Chatham-Kent, encouraging them during pregnancy and helping them to be as prepared and as healthy as possible leading up to the birth of a child. The team provides programs and services that support healthy child development while building parenting skills.

116 parents participated in online prenatal classes


110 participants took part in our Building Healthy Babies program (Canadian Prenatal Nutrition Program) with our Registered Dietitian, Outreach Worker, Public Health Nurses and Community Partners

713 breastfeeding consultations took place

100% of postpartum screens completed against number of live births for families in the Chatham-Kent area.

83% of postpartum families identified with risk who receive contact from the health unit within 48 hours of discharge from hospital by a Public Health Nurse

Infectious Disease & Emergency Management



Throughout 2022, the Infectious Disease & Emergency Management Team lead the public health response to COVID-19. Their efforts to support the community extended beyond the pandemic, continuing to respond to the needs of Chatham-Kent residents in the areas of sexual health and harm reduction.

6,487 COVID-19 cases (probable and confirmed) along with their identified contacts, were managed by CK Public Health

37,460 COVID-19 vaccine doses were administered from CK Public Health inventory (all channels included mass, mobile, in-hospital and primary care hosted immunization clinics)

559 sexually transmitted or bloodborne infections among CK residents reported to and managed by CK Public Health

55 other reports of infectious diseases among CK residents (enteric, food and waterborne, vector borne, and other diseases of public health significance)

235 new clients accessed the Needle Syringe Program

Foundational Standards




In 2022 the Foundational Standards team continued to support COVID surveillance and reporting, vaccine planning and communication. The team also supported the development of a Recovery Strategy Framework to underpin the key work to be done in moving CK Public Health towards pandemic recovery. The framework focused on staff wellness, organizational effectiveness, effective public health practice, partnerships and emergency management. Key initiatives included internal communication and policy development; review of emergency management response; development and initiation of an internal health equity action plan; development of guidance and resources to support program review and planning; and starting the development of a new strategic plan for the organization. Assessment and evaluation work was focused in the area of substance use to support local programming and strategy development.
