OPIOID SURVEILLANCE SUMMARY

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MARCH 2024

EMERGING ISSUES & NEW RESOURCES

CUATUAM KENT ACTIVITY

- In February, several areas across Ontario issued alerts related to increased opioid poisonings and locally, drug poisoning harms have been elevated.
- <u>Toronto's Drug Checking Service</u> has observed an increase in the presence of nitazene opioids in samples that are not expected to contain high-potency opioids; sign up for updates and alerts from the Toronto Drug Checking Service here: https://drugchecking.community/reports/





Figure 2. Rates⁴ of opioid poisoning-related ED visits, hospitalizations and deaths, Chatham-Kent, 2005-22

² EMS calls up to and including February 2024 are based on calls for service by month provided by Chatham-Kent EMS for suspected opioid-related calls.

³ Emergency department visits were provided by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care (Weekly emergency department visits for opioid overdose Week 50: Mar 11-17, 2024). Ontario hospitals are required to report cases of opioid overdose presenting in their EDs to the Canadian Institute for Health Information. CK hospital visit data for October 2023 through January 2024 are not available due to the regional hospital cyber-attack in October 2023. Results are considered preliminary and subject to change as emergency departments continue to submit data. Rates are based on 2022-2023 population projections, and 2019-2021 population estimates.

⁴ 2019 to 2024 suspect drug-related deaths and confirmed opioid deaths are based on the Monthly Summary table provided by the Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario, March 15, 2024. 2005 to 2022 ED visits, hospitalizations and deaths were obtained from Public Health Ontario's <u>Interactive Opioid Tool</u>. Opioid-related deaths include confirmed deaths only, are considered preliminary and are subject to change as remaining cases are closed by the Office of the Chief Coroner of Ontario.
